## To, Too, Two

The words to, too, and two are homophones: words that sound the same, but which have different meanings.

To is a preposition that expresses movement or direction:

We drove to the mall. I will add my name to the list.

**Too** means also, or to a greater degree:

I want to go too. It is too small.

**Two** is a number: I have <u>two</u> dogs.
