



Pronouns | Antecedents

A **pronoun** is a word that takes the place of a noun. The word that a pronoun takes the place of is called the **antecedent**. The pronoun must agree with its antecedent in number: a singular pronoun must replace a singular noun, and a plural pronoun must replace a plural noun.
