



Conjunctions

Coordinating conjunctions are used to join two independent clauses that are of equal importance.

“**and**” (+) and “**nor**” (-) show agreement between clauses.

“**yet**”, and “**but**” show disagreement between clauses.

“**for**” and “**so**” show a reason between clauses.

“**or**” can show either agreement or disagreement between clauses.

When using a coordinating conjunction to join two *independent* clauses (complete thoughts), use a comma before the conjunction.
