



Should vs. Shall

Should is used to express the ideal (best) action which happens in the past, present, or future. The negative of *should* is *should not* or the contraction *shouldn't*. *Shall* expresses a future action. It is different than *will* in that it is used to express an order or prophecy. The negative of *shall* is *shall not* or the contraction *shan't*. For example;

You *should* do your homework. If you study, you *shall* succeed.
