Ben Franklin became involved in politics when he began publishing a newspaper called the Pennsylvania Gazette. He soon became known throughout the American colonies. He spent most of his time in London, England in the 1750s and 1760s, where he represented the Pennsylvania colonists to the British Parliament. He became a voice for all of the American colonies when he protested the Stamp Act of 1765. It was Ben Franklin's arguments that eventually convinced the British Parliament to repeal the Act.

Ben Franklin is also well known for writing and publishing Poor Richard's Almanack. An almanack is a an annual publication full of information and predictions about the upcoming year. Franklin's almanack also included poems, interesting sayings, and scientific information. Franklin sold many copies of his almanack over a period of 25 years.

Ben Franklin was a major figure during the American Revolution. The First Continental Congress, held in 1774, was his idea. He delivered the colonies' petition to King George III of England. In 1775, he became the Pennsylvania delegate to the Second Continental Congress. Franklin was also part of the committee that wrote the Declaration of Independence. He was also the country's first Postmaster General!

Franklin went to France for several years in 1776, where he gathered French support for the American Revolution. This alliance with France was one of the main reasons why the American colonists were able to defeat Britain. Franklin remained in France during the American Revolution, and in 1783, he helped to negotiate the end of the war with the Treaty of Paris.
