

Palindrome

A palindrome is a kind of word play in which a word, phrase, or even a whole sentence is spelled the same way forwards as it is backwards. The word palindrome was coined by the poet and playwright Ben Johnson in the early 1600s. It is a combination of two Greek root words: *palin*, which means "again," and *dromos*, which means "direction."

Greek root words: <i>palin</i> , which means "again," and <i>dromos</i> , which means "direction."

eye, madam, refer
Phrases:
Never odd or even, stressed desserts
Sentence:
Are we not drawn onward, we few, drawn onward to new era?
