



# Uncertainty in Reported Speech

Many words and phrases act like markers in a text to indicate to readers that the author is less than certain about what is being said. Collectively, these words and phrases that indicate uncertainty are called **uncertainty qualifiers**.

Uncertainty qualifiers are not the only way that an author can indicate uncertainty in a text, however. Uncertainty is also indicated when an author attributes information to someone else (reported speech). When considering how much confidence to have in reported speech, consider:

- Whose speech is being reported
- That individual's official role
- The nature of the declaration; is it official, or is it someone's personal opinion?
