Pronouns

A pronoun takes the place of a noun in each sentence. A pronoun can be the subject of a sentence. it can also be the direct object of an action verb or preposition.

Jack carried his books. Jack carried them.

The pronoun "them" takes the place of "his books."

The word that a pronoun takes the place of is called the **antecedent**. In the example above, "his books" is the antecedent of the pronoun "them."
