To | Too | Two

The words to, too and two are homophones: they are words that sound the same, but have very different meanings.

To is a preposition used to express movement or direction to a point (as to from): We went to the mall. I will add your name to the list.

Too means also, to a greater degree: I will have one too. It is too small.

Two is a number: *I have two parents.*
