The Narrator	The Reader
Mad people can't be calm or do things in a smart, methodical way	A person who is mad does not necessarily think they are mad.
a "vulture's eye," it's reasonable to kill the old man to get away from it.	It's not normal to be haunted by something like that and not reasonable to kill over it.
it's normal to groan from mortal terror in the night	the kind of fear the narrator describes and interprets from the old man is not normal

The differences between the narrator's perspective on events and the reader's perspective allows the reader to understand the narrator's state of mind themselves, as opposed to just being old about it. It also contributes to the tension and the tone of the story.
