A parable is a short story that teaches a moral or spiritual lesson, often using symbols or metaphors that the audience can relate to. It is a way to convey a complex moral or spiritual truth in a way that the audience can easily grasp. Because it is in the form of a story, it tends to be more memorable and relatable than just stating the lesson. Also, because the audience has to think about the story and interpret it to get the meaning, they tend to remember the lesson. Examples of well-known parables include The Good Samaritan, The Boy Who Cried Wolf, and The Emperor's New Clothes.
