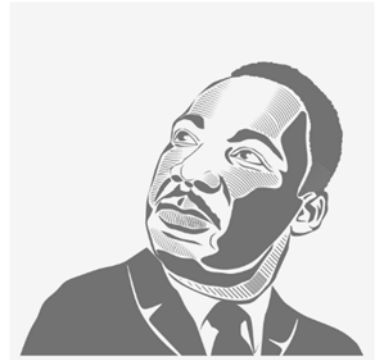


Martin Luther King Jr. Day
