The Executive branch is responsible for governing the country. The Constitution names the President as Commander in Chief of the military. It also gives the office the power to form treaties with other nations, appoint people to public office, and veto legislation.

The Legislative Branch is the branch of government that makes and votes on laws. The powers of this branch of the government also include declaring war, confirming Presidential appointments, and investigating abuses of power across all the branches of the government.

The Judicial branch applies the laws created by the Legislative branch to real-life situations. It is also responsible for ensuring that no U.S. law violates the Constitution.
