



## ANSWERS

The Executive branch has the power to nominate people to serve as judges, but that power is checked by the Legislative branch, which must confirm the appointment, and which also has the power to impeach judges and remove them from office.

The Legislative branch has the power to make laws. They check the Executive branch with the power to override a veto. They are checked by the Executive branch which has the power of the veto and by the Judicial branch which can check the Legislative branch which can declare a law unconstitutional.

The Judicial branch has sole power for interpreting laws, but they are checked by Legislative branch which has the power to make laws and confirm or reject judges and by the Executive branch which has the power to nominate judges and enforce laws.
