



ANSWERS

1. Chiasmus is a literary device in which the grammar of one phrase is inverted in the phrase that follows, so two key concepts from the original phrase reappear in the second phrase in inverted order.
2. Chiasmus has a parallel and "criss-crossed" structure.
3. Antimetabole; they both have a parallel and criss-crossed structure, but in an antimetabole, the same words are repeated in inverse order in both sides of the grammatical structure, which in a chiasmus it is the concepts, not the exact words, that are repeated.
