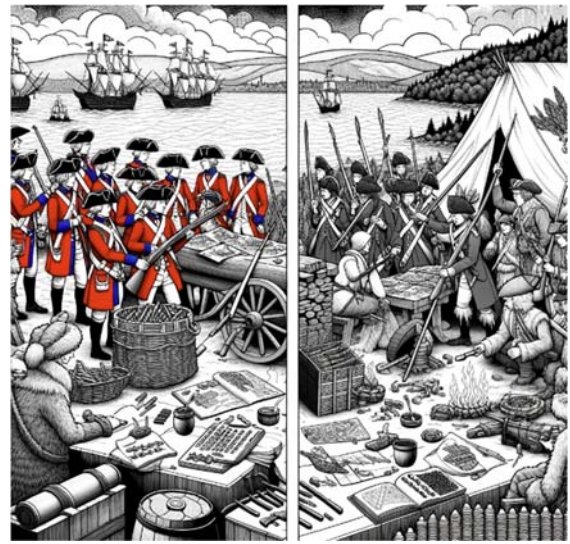

The Clash for Quebec
